

Off the Bimah

In formulating our plans for travel this summer, I had to be cognizant of my need to find a synagogue to say Kaddish each day. Interesting challenges presented themselves: Williamsburg, Virginia, where we vacationed for three days, had only a weekly service. After several phone calls, an old classmate and colleague arranged a minyan near Norfolk. (His Shul, which does not conduct a daily minyan, responded by filling up the Chapel and we had a wonderful reunion.) I attended Reform Services in Berkeley, California, and Orthodox and Conservative Minyanim in San Francisco. One Sunday night at 8 p.m., I came to say Kaddish for Mincha (the Afternoon Service) and found only two people present. One of them made a call and told me that the Chabad House in San Francisco will wait 20 minutes for me if I made it downtown in that time before sunset. As it turned out (and in a scene reminiscent of a celebrated car chase through the hilly streets of San Francisco), my friend was an Orthodox cab driver who led me frantically downtown and, with seconds to spare, I was able to fulfill my obligation.

During this year of Kaddish (which I fulfilled at Beth El and elsewhere, particularly at the Hebrew Home to which I am grateful), I discovered for myself that Kaddish is a spiritual bond between the past and future, that it is a Jew's way to celebrate life, that it has immense therapeutic value, and that its message of continuity and community is a most compelling response to death. I have admired congregants who have made Kaddish a regular part of their lives, daily or weekly. They are subjected to the same inconveniences and obstacles as the rest of us, but they have their priorities straight. They know that, as the word itself implies, Kaddish is holy. In the final tally, they have enriched and ennobled their own lives.

From the President

Beth El has two very critical needs this year - one is volunteers to help in our many activities and the second is financial.

With a congregation the size of Beth El, it is very difficult for either the Rabbi or me to know all of you and to know what areas you excel in and how you could help Beth El. In order to develop a data base to provide us with information about your areas of expertise, your interests, your needs, and the demographics of the congregation, we will be sending you a questionnaire. We urge you to respond to this questionnaire and help us better serve you. One committee that is in need of some volunteers right now is our Havurah Committee. If you are willing to help our Havurah Chairperson, Ann Birk, please give her a call at 365-4447 or let the office know of your interest.

The second area that is very critical is the financial one. Beth El has increased the number of activities we offer to a substantial degree. The myriad of activities offered are extremely costly. We are very appreciative of the role that the Sisterhood has assumed in this area. Claire Marwick and her committee have made a commitment to raise as much money as possible through the sale of Giant, Magruder's and Shalom certificates. You don't even have to come to the synagogue to pick up your certificates - Claire's hard working committee will provide home delivery. The congregation earns 5% of the value of the certificates; however, it costs you no more than if you paid cash or by check. Certificates can be used exactly like cash with change returned. This is the best way to earn money for the congregation without it costing you any extra. Since we earn \$500 for every \$10,000 of certificates sold, we have to sell a lot of certificates to earn a lot of money. If you consider what you spend on food, toiletries, prescriptions, and other items available in these stores, you will see that by using certificates, you can make a big difference. For every member who spends \$200/month in certificates at these stores, we earn \$120/year. While that may not seem like much on an individual basis, it adds up. If 100 members used certificates at that rate, we would earn \$12,000, if 200 members used certificates, we would earn \$24,000, and with 400 members using certificates at that rate, we would earn \$48,000. Clearly, the more people participating in this program, the more we will earn. Also, the more we earn this way, the less we will have to raise in dues and appeals. If you shop at Giant, Magruder's, or Shalom, only do so with certificates you buy from Beth El!!

Tuning in with Cantor Lubin Kol Nidre

The Kol Nidre prayer is undoubtedly one of the most celebrated and best known prayers in the entire Jewish liturgy. This prayer is so well known, not because it contains great religious insights, but rather and perhaps only because its stirring musical setting is generally accepted as an expression of the deep religious feelings which move the Jewish heart on Yom Kippur - The Day of Atonement.

Kol Nidre is, in fact, not a prayer in any given sense of the word. Rather, it is a legalistic formula in Aramaic (with the exception of one single phrase in Hebrew). The history of this strange text is, it must be admitted, still obscure. Read at their face value, the words of the Kol Nidre are certainly startling - especially when we are used to thinking of them as being connected with our holiest feelings at the holiest moment of the Jewish calendar year.

Throughout the history of this legalistic formula, it has been the subject of hostility and attack, misunderstanding and misrepresentation. In fact, many of our great Gaonic authorities were themselves worried about its inclusion in our ritual because of some possible adverse legal ramifications in pronouncing this formula relating to vows and promises made during the year.

These are many theories regarding the exact history of the Kol Nidre; suffice it to state here that almost all authorities agree that the text of the Kol Nidre was created in connection with intolerable anti-Jewish persecutions of the early middle ages. Jews, at various periods during their history, found themselves exposed to relentless persecution. Entire communities were faced with physical extinction unless willing to forsake their faith. Only in this context can one come to an understanding of this strange text and custom. Forced under torture to abandon their faith, a way had to be found for those who gave in, if only temporarily, to return to their ancestral faith once freedom was regained. The recitation of the Kol Nidre formula declared that the oaths and vows which they had made were null and void, for they had been made under duress.

The Kol Nidre gained in significance during the horrible times which the Marranos experienced in Spain as a result of the Inquisition in 1492. These "New Christians," the Marranos who in their heart still clung to Judaism, would assemble on Yom Kippur even in secret cellars to renounce their newly adopted faith which was forced upon them in the first place. Kol Nidre was the form of renunciation they used; and for this reason the text received religious significance.

What could be the meaning of Kol Nidre in times and in countries where freedom prevails? This question has been asked more than once of the Jewish people. The Kol Nidre has become to mean two things to the Jew. Being present at the recitation of the Kol Nidre, a Jew renews his identification with his people and his religion. The Kol Nidre also has become a memorial to Jewish martyrdom. The text, as such, has lost its literal meaning but the liturgical act, the chanting of the stirring and haunting melody, has lifted the

Kol Nidre from a purely legalistic formula, which it once was, into one of the most moving emotional religious acts a Jew can experience.

Havurah Notes

Has Your Havurah Adopted Two Russian Jewish Newcomers?

Thus far, four Beth El Havurot - the Cedar Lane, the Rockville, the Old Georgetown Road, and the River Road - have each adopted two newly arrived Russian Jewish families. Each of the newly arrived families can use a helping hand, Jewish friendship, and exposure to Jewish Life. By integrating these families into the Havurah, the Havurot have provided these links for the

newcomers as well as have enriched their own Havurah.

There is still a large number of Soviet Jewish families who are still arriving in this area. Each family may have different needs. Some can barely speak English or drive an automobile; others can speak English very well and own their own automobile. Some have lived here only a few weeks; others have been here for more than a year. Soma may be able to use your old furniture' others may have moved into their own home.

Kelman Family Leaves Soviet Union

Alla, Boris, and Maxim Kelman arrived in the United States on August 9, 14 years after they first requested permission to leave the Soviet Union. Beth El's Soviet Jewry Committee "adopted" this family 18 months ago and participated in an extensive campaign for their release by contacting American and Soviet officials as well as the Kelman themselves.

The Kelmans have settled in Palo Alto, California where Boris will work for the Union of Councils for Soviet Jews in the San Francisco office of the Bay Area Council for Soviet Jews, coordinating support for the Jewish cultural movement in the Soviet Union.

In a recent interview with the Northern California Jewish Bulletin, Kelman credits his freedom in large part to the "unceasing efforts on behalf of refuseniks by American Jews." (See the article on the bulletin board in the Beth El lobby.)

The Kelmans' oldest son, Efim, was recently married and unable to leave the Soviet Union at this time, but the hope is that he will be able to join his family soon.
