Off the Bimah

In the ancient rabbis' portrait of the world, each person was respected and perceived as a bearer of a divine spark. One could never be sure if one of the beggars sitting at the gates of the city was the messiah, if the prophet Elijah was the stranger knocking at the door. The image is a potent one, of profound import for how Jews have viewed the poor. If each beggar might have been Elijah or even the messiah, then no beggar could be coldly dismissed.

But few of us today look for the messiah in the faces of street people. Our tendency is rather to live in gilded ghettos, to draw the blinds in order to protect a self-contained world untouched by larger problems. It is not that we don't care; we are willing to write checks and work for organizations that help poor people. But we prefer not to be "assaulted" by the raw sight of destitute people who live on the edge.

Each of us must decide what to do when approached by a street person. Some of us will be more comfortable than others giving small amounts when asked. All of us, however, ought to make every effort to avoid the cynicism that comes so quickly. Begging was an honorable profession in traditional Jewish communities. The beggar was credited with serving those solicited by providing them with the opportunity to give ungrudgingly.

Yes, there are con artists out there, but there are also countless numbers of people who don't know how they will buy their next meal. Yes, some of those who approach you could find a job, but there are many people who have been thrown into dire straits by forces beyond their control. The very fact of questioning the sincerity of the beggar is sufficiently demeaning that, the rabbis taught, we are obliged to give without asking. Blaming the victims is wrong, no matter how they intrude upon our peace of mind.

Beyond what we may each do alone, we can do more together. Our synagogue has a social action committee which has planned carefully and will guide Beth El's participation in the CBS (Congregation Based Shelter) Program for one week in May.

Maybe if our children were to find hungry people at synagogue soup kitchens when they arrive for classes, they would learn about the true meaning of "kedushah" (holiness). Sometimes we protect our children from unpleasant realities at the risk of not teaching them how to be true mensches.

It is always time to work for government policies that will reduce homelessness. But let us not rely on the government to shield us from poor people. As long as poverty persists, let us recall that the divine spark in human beings is not smaller when their bank accounts are empty. Remembering the divine spark should fire us into action.

Keruv

Dear Keruv: My children attend religious school and our family is identifiably Jewish. To the world we are Jews, but to most of the Jewish community only I am because my wife isn't Jewish. Why isn't our religious observance and our loyalty to Jewish causes enough to make us all Jewish? Congregant

Dear Congregant: Under Jewish law, a person is Jewish if the mother is Jewish. The religion of the father is irrelevant, as is the level of the individual's religious observance. Further, there are no half-Jews: a person is either Jewish or not Jewish.

While these laws may not seem fair to you, these are laws the Jewish people have followed for centuries, with roots in the Bible (Deuteronomy 7:4), the Talmud and the later writings of the Rabbis. Some also cite a practical reason for the law: at the time of a child's birth, the mother (and her religion) is known, but not the father.

Judaism is not closed to your children; you and your wife may act in their behalf to give them Judaism by conversion. (This must be done before they become b'nai mitzvah.) Once converted, the laws which disturb you now would defend your children as Jews in everyone's eyes.

Guest speakers are one aspect of enrichment which our students have benefitted from over the years. Guest artists such as Tamar Fishman and Jeanette Kuvin Oren have worked with our students; Israel expert Daniel Mann shared his knowledge with upper school students; and recently Robert Gerwin and Miriam Kelty spoke to our 8th graders about the work of the Chevra Kadisha. Shavuot

Shavuot will take place this year on May 16th and 17th. Literally, "the holiday of weeks," Shavuot marks the culmination of the 50-day counting period of the agricultural harvest -- thus explaining its name Yom Ha-Bikkurim, the holiday of first fruits. Shavuot also has historical significance, since tradition states that the Torah was presented to the Jewish people on the 6th day of Sivan. For this reason, Shavuot is designated as Z'man Matan Toratenu -- the time of giving our Torah.

Special Torah readings are assigned for these two days of Yom Tov -- the highlight of which is the chanting of the Decalogue on the first morning. On the second day, Yizkor memorial prayers are said.

Shavuot is a triple holiday, a three-fold celebration which commemorates:

- *The giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai
- *The harvesting of wheat in Israel
- *The ripening of the first fruit in the Holy Land

The Rabbis declared Shavuot to be the most pleasant of all Jewish holidays. It complements Passover well and brings that great festival to a glorious conclusion. On Passover the Jews were freed from slavery, and on Shavuot the freed slaves were transformed into free human beings by the Ten Commandments.

Danny Siegel has a B.S. in Comparative Literature from Columbia University's School of General Studies and a Bachelor's and Master's of Hebrew Literature from the Jewish Theological Seminary of America. He is one of three recipients of the prestigious 1993 Covenant Award for Exceptional Jewish Educators.
