Keruv

Dear Keruv: What are the conditions of membership in Beth El; specifically do you ask if the Jewish applicants are converts? If you were made aware that a Jewish member or applicant had been converted by a Reform rabbi, would you request him/her to "convert" again in the Conservative mode? Would a Conservative rabbi agree to marry converted Reform Jews? Congregant

Dear Congregant: Beth El welcomes all Jews into its membership -- Jews by birth and Jews by conversion. In our application for membership, we assume that a person who identifies him/herself as a Jew is Jewish; there is no need to question whether the individual is Jewish by birth or conversion because under our laws, it makes no difference. There is only one "category" of Jews.

Members who were converted by Reform rabbis, therefore, are not asked to convert again by our rabbis. If the rabbi were somehow made aware that a congregant was converted by a Reform rabbi, he might gently suggest immersion in the mikveh in order to satisfy legal requirements and, perhaps, an individual's personal needs. The rabbi would not monitor this suggestion, particularly if it would offend the congregant or if the conversion occurred long ago. Beth El accepts as Jewish anyone converted by a recognized rabbi.

Conservative rabbis will marry Jews converted by Reform rabbis if the legal requirements for conversion have been met. For counsel in specific situations, please talk to Rabbi Maltzman.

Keruv wants to answer your questions! Feel free to ask about almost anything, and we will try to answer you in the Beth El Scroll or, if you prefer, privately.

Keruv ("outreach") was formed to address the issues of intermarriage at Beth El. New England Ramah Seeks Tikvah Alumni

Camp Ramah in New England is seeking alumni, their families and former staff of the Tikvah Program, which was established in 1970 to meet the religious and educational needs of developmentally disabled Jewish adolescents.

The summer of 1994 will mark the 25th anniversary of Tikvah, and several events are scheduled to mark this significant milestone:

An alumni reunion on July 24th - 26th at the campsite in Palmer, Massachusetts.

A Tikvah 25 dinner celebration honoring the founding directors of the program, Herb and Barbara Greenberg, on October 9th in Woodbridge, CT.

The production of a promotional videotape documenting the history and impact of the Tikvah Program. This tape will be used as the centerpiece of a campaign to raise a Tikvah scholarship endowment and funds for a Tikvah training center.

After Tikvah was established and proven successful in the Ramah setting in New England, the program was replicated at Camps Ramah in Wisconsin, California and Canada. These programs have benefitted hundreds of Jewish adolescents with special needs and their families. For many counselors and staff members, the experience of working in the Tikvah Program provided a stimulus for pursuing careers in special education.

From the Principal

On Shabbat, May 21st, Religious School teachers were honored for their service to the synagogue. Representing the faculty with aliyot were Helen Rib and Cheryl Kreiser. Our teachers have turned in a remarkable effort this year with many noteworthy accomplishments. Our program of Hebrew instruction continues to achieve exceptional standards. This is in evidence from the second graders, most of whom have mastered or are approaching mastery of the fundamentals of reading Hebrew, through the sixth and seventh graders, who have mastered an extraordinarily challenging list of prayer goals. The Judaic studies curriculum is taught with flair and imagination. Many new components have been added over the year making this aspect of our program reflect contemporary pedagogic trends in Jewish education. Enrichment activities and programs are integrated into the curriculum, further enhancing the quality of education we have been able to offer. Acting on the content of their lessons, our 8th-10th graders were active in the community fulfilling acts of gemilut hasadim at such locations as soup kitchens, homeless shelters, and group homes.

We have quite a remarkable faculty. A classic administrator's challenge is to initiate and to implement change. Teachers have a particular notoriety in that direction. This is far from the case with our teachers who are often the source of the impetus for change. Some other highlights this year were our involvement with tikkun olam projects, the second year of the performance based groupings for tefillah instruction, the addition of several new field trips, the youth choir, dramatically improved home-school communication, parent/family education, and the commitment to an in-house teacher professional development program.

Thanks to our teachers, it has been another excellent year for our school. We continue to go from strength to strength. An oft heard phrase in faculty meetings is: "We will do even better next year." I look forward to seeing everyone back energized and ready for the 1994-95 school year.

4th grade Ten Commandments

In their study of the Ten Commandments, Yonina Michelson's fourth grade class composed their own, contemporary versions. Below is a pooling of student's work into a 1994 version of the Ten Commandments:

- Remember you have only one God;
- Always study the Torah and teach it to your children;
- You shall keep peace;
- You shall not have any gun stores;
- You shall honor your teacher;
- You shall recycle and help the planet, you shall not pollute, you shall only hunt if you have a shortage of food;
- You shall not commit child abuse, you shall respect a child's creativity;
- You shall not take drugs, you shall not get drunk;
- You shall buy your pet from an animal shelter;
- You shall not show your prejudice in violence.

Enrollment - Our student population is growing at a phenomenal rate. Last year enrollment peaked in January at 360. As of this mid-June writing, enrollment for the 1994-95 school year stands at 327 students. If everyone who has not yet re-registered sent in their forms, we would go over 400 in student population. The 327 figure is 7 more than were enrolled in the school two years ago. For each of the past two years we have grown by 40 students. Next year will be the first in recent memory with two early session classes for every grade K-7. You may ask where we are going to fit all these students. Several early session classes are already at full enrollment, but there is space for many more students in the late session. Thank you, parents, for choosing to enroll your children in our school and for presenting us so favorably in the community.

Israel Quest Designed To Keep Jewish Youth Jewish

Do you know your child's Jewish IQ? As participants in the joint UJA Federation/Congregation Beth El new teen identity project -- Israel Quest (IQ) -- teens will raise their Jewish IQ as they participate in exciting activities designed to keep Jewish youth Jewish.

Research indicates that teens receive conflicting signals from the Jewish and secular worlds which lead many to abandon their Jewish identity as they grow older. Israel Quest is designed to expand Jewish learning, allow teens and pre-teens to make new friends, give them the opportunity to experience a deepened connection to the Jewish community and Israel and, ultimately, to secure the survival of the Jewish people.

Pre-teens and teens can join Israel Quest by enrolling in Beth El's confirmation program (which begins in grade 8 and continues through grade 10); they will receive extended Jewish education and will join other groups throughout the metropolitan area (over 44 other Synagogue and youth group partnerships have been formed with UJA Federation) for exciting annual community-wide social, cultural and educational events. And, as IQ participants, teens will earn the right to receive from \$1250 to \$1500 from UJA Federation and Beth El for use toward an exciting teen Israel experience of their choice during their sophomore or junior year in high school or the summer immediately after. Upon their return from Israel, the teens will be offered programming for college preparation.

We are proud that Congregation Beth El was the first synagogue in the area to endorse Israel Quest. We are equally proud to note that on March 12, 1994, during his Bar Mitzvah service, Steven Feldman became the first teen in the area to be awarded his Israel Quest Passport.

Begin to Read Hebrew in a Single Day
