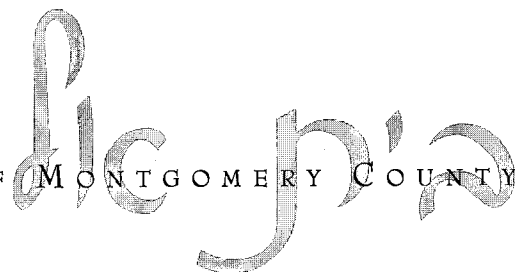
## Off the Bimah

Why is food so central to us? Ours is a religion that has created an elaborate eating system, defining regulations and restrictions in abundance. In addition, this eating system has always been central to Jewish identity—ancient writers all knew that Jews do not eat pork. But when we say food is religiously significant, we mean much more than this. In a wonderful course in the Talmud department at the Jewish Theological Seminary (called “Jewish Eating”!!) I had occasion to explore this theme. Let me illustrate: In the Biblical story found in chapter 27 of Genesis, Isaac asks Esau to bring him red-blooded meat “and I will eat in order that my soul may bless you before I die.” In other words, without eating there can be no blessing. The one to be blessed must first provide the food, then Isaac will articulate the blessing.

Ours is not only a religion of ritual and tradition. It is a religion of the kitchen, a way of life in which the masters of the kitchen sustained and continue to sustain the body and the soul together. Food matters; it has always mattered Jewishly; it helps make our homes complete.

## Thoughts from the Beth El Clergy on the Capital Campaign

Rabbis Maltzman and Rudolph and Hazzan Lubin have already made pledges to the Beth El Capital Campaign. Jon Miller Steiger, a member of the congregation, asked our clergy for their thoughts about the Campaign and Beth El. Excerpts of those conversations follow.

### Rabbi Maltzman



"There are a lot of events that are converging right now," says Rabbi Maltzman, "to make the time ripe for the Capital Campaign: The new millennium, the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our congregation, and the realization that we're absolutely in need of building improvement." As things now stand, the congregation is "unable to meet our spiritual, educational and religious needs."

"The Capital Campaign is necessary to provide more services for the current members of the congregation," Rabbi Maltzman says. "Beth El should be able to give its members everything they need."

Rabbi Maltzman wants the congregation to be able to "provide more opportunities for people to meet their spiritual and religious needs. We want to make the synagogue an even more welcoming and inviting place despite its size."

For these reasons, and because "the leadership of the congregation needs to set an example," Rabbi Maltzman decided to pledge to the Campaign right away. "We are, on a very personal level, making a genuine commitment." In short, Rabbi Maltzman thinks that "the need has been building up for years and has now reached the point where we need to act. This is an opportunity to give a concrete expression to our vision."

### Hazzan Lubin



When asked why the Capital Campaign was needed now, Hazzan Lubin cited Mishnah: "If not now, when?" He noted that the congregation "has grown in vital and beautiful ways. Because of this, our programs and services - with a capital and lower-case 's' - are strained in terms of being able to satisfy all the needs of the congregation." He pledged to the Campaign because "as Hazzan of our congregation, I see the possibility of an exciting diversity of programs and services. Contributing at this point in the Campaign is my modest way of saying I'm excited, committed and bullish on Beth El."

Hazzan Lubin sees the Campaign as a way to help improve spaces for the library, our educational needs, socializing and the congregation professionals. He says that the congregation "should make sure that the environment is pleasing, and aesthetically, I'm very excited by the early discussions of the architectural and design possibilities."

"I was a newcomer almost nine years ago," Hazzan Lubin says. "And from the beginning, I sensed a special quality in this congregation. It is made up of people who are serious about being Jewish and serious about their membership in the congregation. I'm excited about the Capital Campaign because it is a response to the enthusiasm and needs of the congregation." He hopes the Campaign will generate excitement among the members of the congregation, and is very optimistic that a large majority of congregants will participate. "I know the congregation will respond."

### Rabbi Rudolph



"Beth El is bursting with activity and the facility is bursting altogether," says Rabbi Rudolph. The Rabbi mentions limitations placed on school programming, Sisterhood and Men's Club activities, and use of the Chapel as particular areas to address: "The needs are clear, and the state of the economy makes the timing a good match for the planning." He says that the Campaign "offers us an opportunity to build a stronger sense of community among members and to reach out to all portions of the membership."

Rabbi Rudolph also emphasizes the clergy's involvement in the Campaign. "We clergy practically live at 8215 Old Georgetown Road. We see the limitations of the physical plant every day." Their early pledges mean that they see the needs and they understand that "synagogue leadership, volunteer and professional, must show that leadership on every important matter that affects us. What we say must be matched by what we do. On this matter, there was never the slightest hesitation to say or to do."

A refurbished building will mark a "new stage of vitality" for an already very successful congregation, Rabbi Rudolph says, and will allow more members to become involved in ongoing programs. He wants to tell the congregation: "Some houses we build for ourselves, some houses we build for others. A synagogue is both. If it is a good, busy, dynamic synagogue, it needs rebuilding and refurbishing periodically. Just like our own houses. But in this case, to serve our growing community and for the greater glory of God. We hope you are able to help with this holy work."

## Religious School News

The Kosovo crisis has inspired relief efforts that have included such organizations as the Israeli army (which most famously set up a MASH unit) and the Joint Distribution Committee, a long-time player in Eastern Europe. During the month of April, students from the Religious School raised over \$100 to be contributed to the JDC's Kosovo Relief effort.

Every month the Religious School sponsors a tikkun olam project. The winter clothing drive in November has been a long-running success, and the Kosher for Pesach collection in March has helped put food in many needy Jewish homes for several years. We have developed a spiral curriculum which makes it possible for students at all grade levels to meaningfully participate in the project of the month. Traditionally, we have included a tzedakah project one of the months. This year the tzedakah drive was set to coincide with Yom HaShoah. The situation in Kosovo easily related to many aspects of the Shoah, inspired many important classroom discussions about historical memory, learning from the past, loyalty to friends and issues of war and peace.
