About the 5782 High Holiday Experience

This year, Beth El is excited to offer an array of both inperson and virtual High Holiday experiences. Our Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur programming brings back in-person services that reflect the traditions we enjoyed pre-pandemic, but also includes virtual and at-home experiences that make participation more possible, engaging, and accessible. Beth El is committed to providing a spiritual and joyful High Holiday experience for all as we renew ourselves and our spirits in the new year.

We know some are eager to return to the halls of Beth El, while others have found meaning and spirituality in at-home and outdoor worship spaces. And we recognize that we have varying comfort levels with being together in person in large groups. The more traditional elements of Beth El's High Holiday services and programming are included in this package.

As we are re-emerging, we are taking the opportunity to build from our strengths and will introduce new, engaging service and programming offerings that will complement the customs and traditions that lie at our core. Please watch your email, as well as the Beth El website and social media pages for information as more details about these programs become available.

What services will be available?

Service offerings will include Traditional services, as well as the Kol Haneshama, Family, and Children's services. There will be both in-person and virtual service options. See pages 8 and 9 in this booklet for a complete service schedule.

Will there be capacity limits at in-person services?

We expect all service venues will be open at full capacity.

What COVID protocols will be in place?

A decision on masking will be made later in the summer by the Beth El COVID Task Force considering varying comfort levels, as well as our younger congregants ages 12 and younger, who remain unable to be vaccinated. We do not anticipate checking vaccination cards, taking temperatures, or contact tracing. Junior Congregation (grades 6 and 7) will be held only at the Bethesda Hyatt to allow for greater spacing between a likely mix of vaccinated and unvaccinated students.

Will we have a second location?

Yes. Previous locations are unavailable due to ongoing construction. As such, we will be utilizing the Hyatt in downtown Bethesda for our second Traditional service, an additional young family (under 2nd grade) service, and Junior Congregation. Parking vouchers will be provided for each day for those attending this service.

Will we be able to bring non-member guests?

Yes. Tickets for non-member guests are \$250/adult and \$125/child under 18.

Will babysitting be available?

We anticipate babysitting will be available during services taking place at Beth El for children ages 2-6. Please complete the enclosed form to request babysitting.

What virtual options will be available?

Beth El will offer livestreams of the Main Sanctuary service, as well as dedicated Zoom services and the virtual lobby many enjoyed last year. Additional details on virtual services can be found in the full service schedule. Virtual options will be open to all congregants and accessible through a password-protected webpage. For the privacy of our members, you must register for High Holiday tickets (even if you plan to attend only virtually) to receive the password.

Will there be family-friendly in-person options?

Yes! The popular neighborhood shofar blowing will continue, a new family-focused Taschlich is scheduled, and a number of both indoor and outdoor in-person experiences at the synagogue and in the community are in the works. Please watch the Shabbat Announcements and social media for more information as these programs are finalized. In addition, Beth El is assembling a library of materials to support those who choose to host at-home services for family and friends.

Please note all plans detailed throughout this packet reflect our expectations at this time and given the current state of the pandemic. As we've become accustomed to, everything is subject to change should COVID numbers increase or other parameters change.

High Holiday Information

Information regarding High Holiday Services, tickets, and other important details is included in this mailing. Take a few moments to review it, and feel free to call the office at 301-652-2606 if you have any questions.

Rosh Hashanah begins Monday evening, September 6. Make sure to return your High Holiday Registration Form as soon as possible.

High Holiday Service Details

Congregation Beth El offers multiple services for congregants and guests.

Main Service in the Beth El Bender Sanctuary and at Hyatt Regency in downtown Bethesda:

Returning to traditions that go back decades at Beth El, there will be two main services on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur (only one location on the second day of Rosh Hashanah). The Main Services are officiated by Rabbi Greg Harris, Rabbi Deborah Megdal, Hazzan Asa Fradkin, and lay leaders. They bring together families and friends for familiar prayers, powerful spiritual moments, and provocative sermons. Synagogue leaders are honored for their service to the community. The Conservative movement's High Holiday prayer book, *Mahzor Lev Shalem*, is used. Special musical arrangements of the prayers complement traditional readings. The Main Sanctuary service will be livestreamed.

Kol Haneshama:

Offered on the first day of Rosh Hashanah, Kol Nidre, and Yom Kippur through the end of Musaf, Kol Haneshama is a mix of tradition and innovation, music and ideas. Led by Rabbi Jenna Stein Turow and congregants, the service is warm and accessible, participatory, and engaging. The Kol Haneshama service will be livestreamed

Family Services:

Offered on both days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur morning, the Family Service is geared toward families with children in 3rd - 5th grades (younger and older siblings are welcome). Led by Rabbi Jess Minnen, the services are designed to include both parents and children in the themes of the holidays, exploring Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur through stories, songs, and prayer. Due to space limitations, at least one child in the household must be in the appropriate grade range in order for Family Service tickets to be issued. A virtual Family Service is also available this year.

Services and Programming for Children, Teens, and Young Families:

- Young Family Service: This service for young families with children from birth to 2nd grade celebrates and recognizes the holidays with singing and stories.
- Junior Congregation: This service for children in 6th and 7th grades offers a focus on prayer and making connections with the holidays as students prepare for the b'nai mitzvah. This year, this service will be held only at the Hyatt Regency to allow for greater social distancing.
- Teen Discussions: In addition to attending a service above, all post-b'nai mitzvah teens are invited to discuss themes of the High Holidays with members of Beth El's Upper School faculty. Both in-person and virtual teen discussions will be available.

Ma'ariv and Meditation:

Held on the second evening of Rosh Hashanah, the Ma'ariv and Meditation service offers a second chance to look back, look within, and settle ourselves on the path of spiritual renewal.

Tashlich

Beth El gathers on the bridge over the stream behind the Sunrise Senior Living building (formerly Spring House) on Battery Lane to conduct the ritual of symbolically throwing our sins in a body of moving water at Tashlich. New this year, we will also have a separate Tashlich service for young families. BYO stale bagels and bread.

Virtual and At-Home Services and Programming:

Recognizing that spirituality happens well beyond the sanctuary, Beth El will offer a variety of virtual and community-based services and programs. A list of planned services is included on the next page and details on the many additional programs being planned will be forthcoming.

Payment Information

How to Pay

Payment for all dues, tuition, Yizkor book, and youth and affinity groups, should be made by check payable to Beth El, unless you are paying through the member portal (see next paragraph). At least the first quarter of your dues and Religious School tuition (if applicable) must be returned with your High Holiday Registration Form in order to receive High Holiday tickets.

High Holiday Registration through the Member Portal

Congregants can make payments, request High Holiday seats, and update their Yizkor book information through the member portal. Make payments on the "My Finances" tab; check the boxes next to the desired invoices, then click "Pay Bills" and follow the directions. Links to request High Holiday tickets and Yizkor book information are available on the home page under "My Messages." Log in or sign up for the member portal at at members.bethelmc.org. High Holiday Seats

On the Registration Form, please rank your first three choices of service location and enter the total number of tickets needed for members, children 7-25 years of age (as of June 1, 2021), and non-members, or indicate if you wish to attend services virtually only. Full payment for additional High Holiday tickets must accompany the Registration Form.

While tickets are for a specific service, there is no reserved seating within each service. Seating is first-come, first-served. Please help us accommodate everyone comfortably and without commotion by not holding seats for family members and/or guests who arrive later. Ushers will fill unoccupied seats as needed.

High Holiday Registration Forms will be processed on a first-come, first-served basis. In order to maximize the probability of obtaining seats for the service of your choice, please submit the Registration Form, together with the appropriate payment, as soon as possible; tickets will go on sale to non-members after Monday, August 9. The form must be fully completed and include payment of any past-due balance, at least one quarter of the 2021-2022 membership dues, security assessment, building fund, and tuition (if applicable), and full payment of optional organization/activity fees and additional High Holiday tickets. Please order tickets for yourself and immediate family members only if they are attending services.

In accordance with our policy, we can provide free tickets to members' children who did not reach their 26th birthday before June 1, 2021. Tickets for adult children 26 and over, relatives of Beth El families visiting for the High Holidays, and members of the community may be purchased for \$250 per adult and \$125 per child under 18. Alternatively, those between 26-29 years of age may join Beth El for \$50 (individual) or \$100 (couple).

Yizkor Memorial Book

You may memorialize your loved ones by submitting their names on the Yizkor Book form included in this registration packet or on the member portal. Please be sure to print the names clearly. Listings for the Yizkor Memorial Book must be received by Monday, August 9. Please make sure your name is on the form. It is customary, but not required, to give a donation in memory of your loved ones when listing their names in the Yizkor Book.
